2 Safety

2.1 Safety Instructions

International safety regulations have been strictly observed in the design and testing of the inverter. Before beginning any work, carefully read all safety instructions, and always observe them when working on or with the inverter. The installation must follow all applicable national or local standards and regulations.

Incorrect installation may cause:

- *injury or death to the installer, operator or third party*
- damage to the inverter or other attached equipment

2.2 Important Safety Notifications

There are various safety concerns that must be carefully observed before, during, and after the installation, as well as during future operation and maintenance. The following are important safety notifications for the installer and any end users of this product under normal operating conditions.



Dangers of High Voltages and Large Current

- 1. **Beware of high PV voltage.** Please install an external DC disconnect switch or breaker and ensure it is in the "off" or "open" position before installing or working on the inverter. Use a voltmeter to confirm there is no voltage present to avoid electric shock.
- 2. **Beware of high grid voltage.** Please ensure the AC switch and/or AC breaker are in the "off" or "open" position before installing or working on the inverter. Use a voltmeter to confirm there is no voltage present to avoid electric shock.
- 3. **Beware of high battery current.** Please ensure that the battery module breakers and/or on/off switches are in the "open" or "off" position before installing or working on the inverter. Use a voltmeter to confirm there is no voltage present to avoid electric shock.
- 4. **Do not open the inverter while it is operating** to avoid electric shock and damage from live voltage and current within the system.
- 5. Do not make any connections or disconnections (PV, battery, grid, communication, etc.) while the inverter is operating.
- 6. An installer should make sure to be well protected by reasonable and professional insulative equipment [e.g., personal protective equipment (PPE)].
- 7. Before installing, operating, or maintaining the system, it is important to inspect all existing wiring to ensure that it meets the appropriate specifications and conditions for use.
- 8. Ensure that the PV, battery, and grid connections to the inverter are secure and proper to prevent damage or injuries caused by improper installation.

Warning

- All work on this product (system design, installation, operation, setting, configuration, and maintenance) must be carried out by qualified personnel. To reduce the risk of electric shock, do not perform any servicing other than those specified in the operating instructions unless you are qualified to do so.
- 2. Read all instructions before installing. For electrical work, follow all local and national wiring standards, regulations, and these installation instructions.
- 3. Make sure the inverter is properly grounded. All wiring should be in accordance with the National Electrical Code (NEC), ANSI/NFPA 70.
- 4. The inverter and system can inter-connect with the utility grid only if the utility provider permits. Consult with your local AHJ (Authority Having Jurisdiction) before installing this product for any additional regulations and requirements for your area.
- 5. All warning labels and nameplates on this inverter should be clearly visible and must not be removed or covered.
- 6. The installer should consider the safety of future users when choosing the inverter's correct position and location as specified in this manual.
- 7. Please keep children away from touching or misusing the inverter and relevant systems.
- 8. **Beware!** The inverter and some parts of the system can be hot when in use, please do not touch the inverter's surface or most of the parts when they are operating. During operation, only the LCD and buttons should be touched.

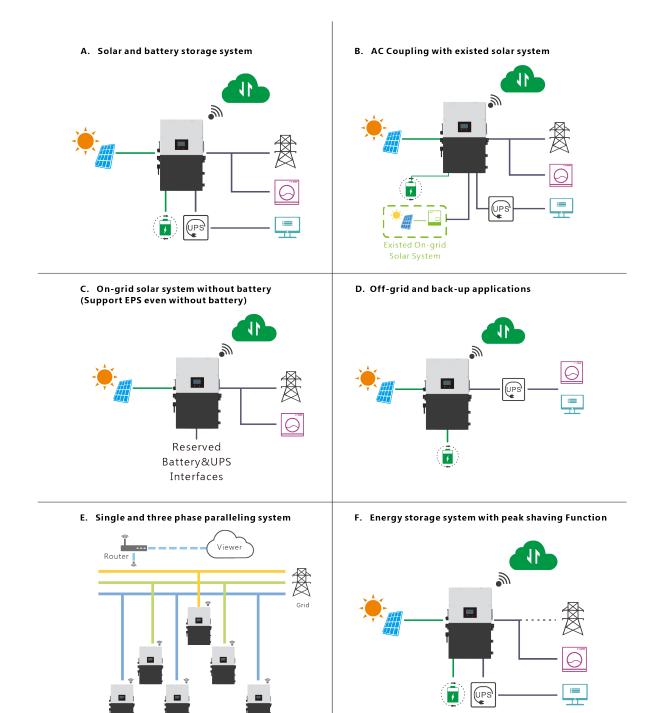

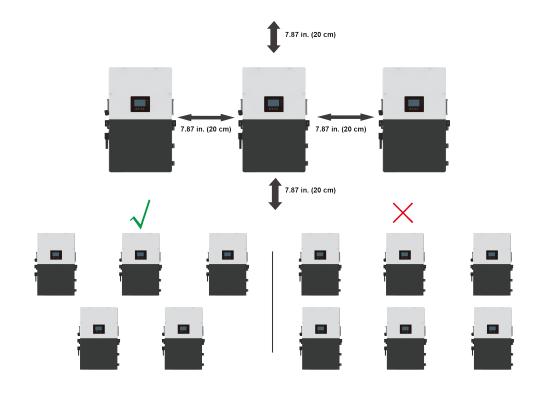

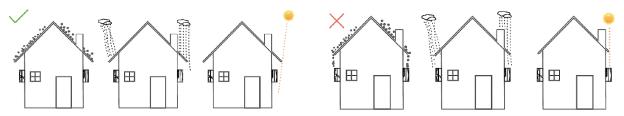
4.2 Location Selection and Installation

4.2.1 Requirements for Installation Location

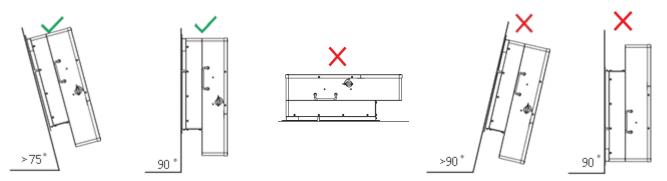
- 1. The mounting wall should be strong enough to bear the weight of the inverter.
- 2. Please maintain the minimum clearances presented below for adequate heat dissipation.



3. Never position the inverter in direct sunlight. Please refer to the figure below and choose a wellshaded site or a shed to protect the inverter from direct sunlight. PROTECT the LCD screen from excessive UV exposure.

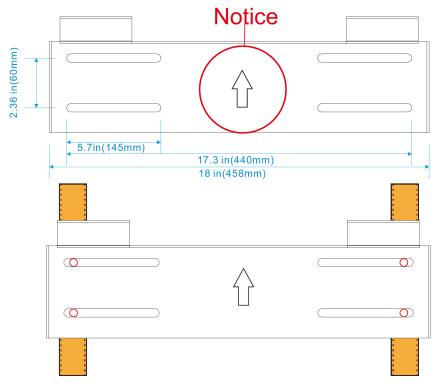


4. The inverter should be installed upright on a vertical surface.



4.2.2 Installing the Inverter

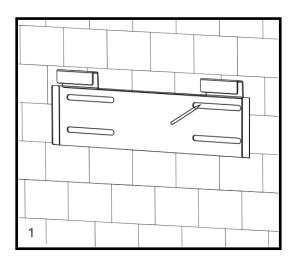
The inverter is designed to be wall-mounted and should be installed on a vertical, solid, mounting surface, such as brick, concrete, or other **non-combustible** material. Two or more people may be needed to install the inverter due to its weight. The slots on the mounting bracket can accommodate various stud spacings from 12 in. (305 mm) to 16 in. (406 mm).



4.2.3 Mounting Steps

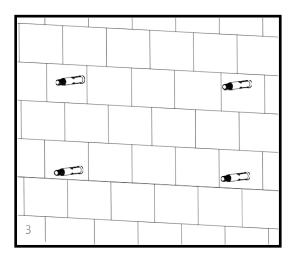
For installation on brick or concrete:

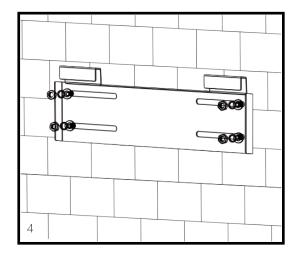
- 1. Mark the drill hole positions with the mounting bracket.
- 2. Drill four, 5/16 in. (48 mm) diameter holes, making sure the holes are deeper than 2 in. (50 mm).



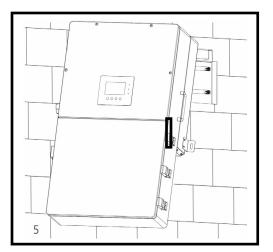


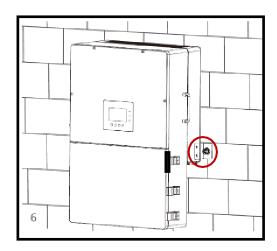
- 3. Insert the expansion bolts into the holes and tighten.
- 4. Use the corresponding nuts and washers (packaged together with the expansion bolts) to install and affix the wall-mount bracket onto the wall.





5. Hang the inverter on the wall-mount bracket and lock the inverter on the wall using two (2) selftapping screws on the top of the inverter (not included with inverter). Lock the safety screws on the left and right sides.





For installation on concrete board with wood studs:

Fasten the mounting bracket to the studs with four (4) heavy duty wood screws, then hang the inverter on the bracket and lock the inverter on the wall with two (2) self-tapping screws.

Please note that the wood screws and self-tapping screws are not provided with the inverter. Installers will need to acquire the screws before installation.

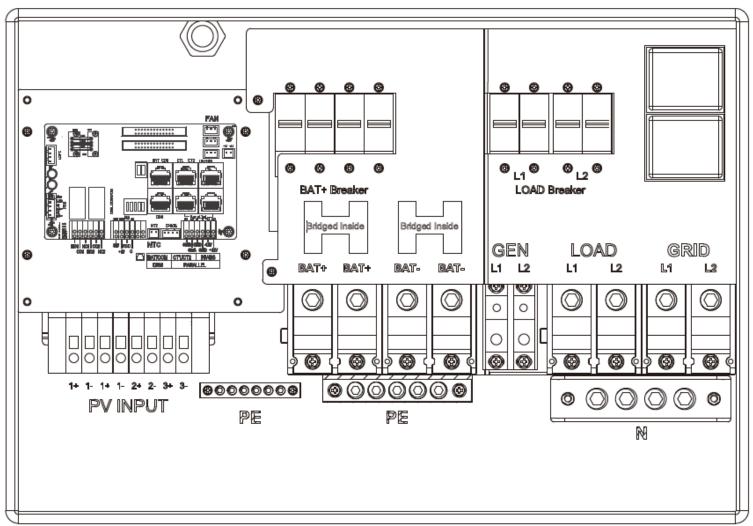

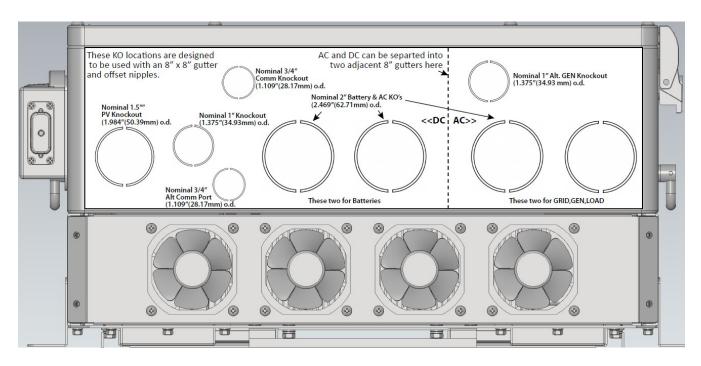

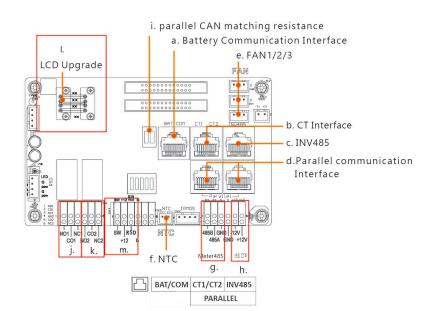

4.4 PV Connection

4.4.1 Connecting PV to the Inverter

Cable Requirements:

Consult with your installer to ensure that appropriate cable sizing is used due to various factors such as voltage drop and VOC.

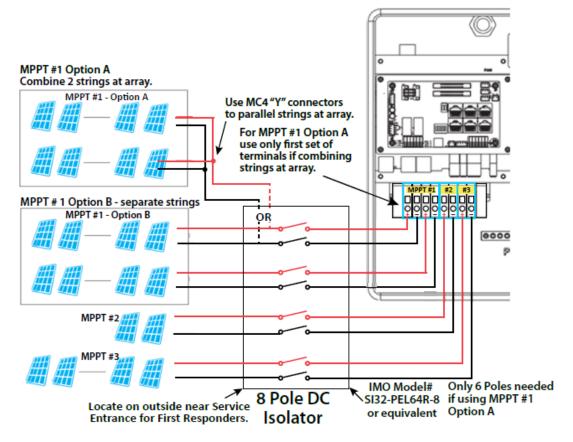


Reminder

Verify the lowest ambient temperature of the installation location. The rated VOC on the solar module nameplate is obtained at STC (77°F/25°C). As the ambient temperature drops, the solar module VOC increases. Please ensure the maximum solar string voltage, corrected at the lowest temperature, does not exceed the inverter's maximum input voltage of 600V.

4.4.2 String Sizing



When solar modules are put in a series string, the voltage multiplies times the number of modules and the amperage stays the same as each module.

For example: Using solar modules that have a 40 Voc (77°F) with an amperage of 10 Amps (Imp) - 10 modules wired in a series string would have a Voc of 400 VDC (at 77°F) and a string amperage of 10 Amps. When the temperature lowers the voltage can rise above the maximum allowed by the inverter and damage will result.

CAUTION: To determine how many modules you can have per string; first verify the lowest possible ambient temperature of the installation location. Next, find the rated Voc, Vmp, Isc and Imp of the solar module at 25°C and the temperature coefficients for voltage and power. Then calculate highest possible Voc for the entire string when the ambient temperature falls to the lowest possible ambient temperature upon sunrise. To make this calculation, use a string calculator or consult your solar designer or solar electrician.

DANGER! -DAMAGE WILL OCCUR if the string voltage on a cold sunny morning exceeds the inverter's maximum input voltage of 600V!

String Sizing continued...

Finally, calculate the maximum current of the string so as not to exceed the Inverter's MPPT circuit ratings. Double check if the calculated Vmp range is within the 230-500 VDC optimal MPPT circuit operating range. Consult a solar designer if needed.

FOR ALL MODULES, THE CALCULATIONS NEED TO BE PERFORMED OR VERIFIED BY USING A STRING CAL-CULATOR OR CONSULTING A PROFESSIONAL.

The inverter has three MPPT PV charging circuits. MPPT #1 will use up to 25 amps which means two strings can be paralleled for any modules having less than a 12.5 A (Imp) rating. MPPT #2 and MPPT #3 will use up to 15 Amps each so they are usually limited to one string. (Unless you have a module with < 7.5 Amps) Each string ideally should contain the same model, brand, and quantity of panels for ease of design, racking and wiring. However, varying string sizes can be used for unique MPPTs. If two strings are used for MPPT #1 they MUST be the same model, brand and # per string. MPPT#2 and MPPT #3 could differ in model, brand and # per string (same make/model per string) on condition that each string complies with the lowest temperature (maximum string number) and maximum amperage calculations above.

All panels on a series/parallel string should face the same orientation and hopefully be exposed to roughly the same shading across the string. Consideration should be placed on string location and wiring order on the racking to minimize shading effects. One shaded module can disproportionately reduce output for the entire string so avoiding linear strings in favor of rectangular strings can increase output. Optimizers can also achieve this.

The inverter will limit the total MPPT current to 25 A for MPPT #1 and to 15 Amps for MPPT #2 and 15 Amps for MPPT #3.

Note: The array can have a higher Imp than the 25A/15A specified, but the MPPTs will not make full use of the extra current. Having an array that can produce more current than the MPPTs will bring in is useful for increasing morning, winter or cloudy day solar production.

4.4.3 Steps for PV Wiring

	1.	Ensure all breakers and disconnect switches are in the OFF position before connecting or disconnecting wires. Use a voltmeter to confirm there is no voltage present.
	2.	Strip off $1/4 - 5/16$ in. (6 - 8 mm) insulation on the PV string's positive and negative conductors.
	3.	Use wire ferrules for the PV string conductors if they are stranded wire.
	4.	Insert the conduit fitting into the opening for the PV con- nection and tighten it from the inside using the counter nut.
FV NP81 00000000	5.	Route the PV conductors through the conduit fitting and into the inverter.
	6.	Secure the PV conductors in place into the inverter inputs. Verify that they are secured properly by <i>lightly</i> pulling on them.
	7.	Ensure the conduit and conduit fittings are fastened reliably and the cable entry holes are sealed.

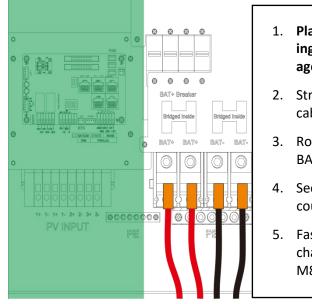
Note: According to the NEC (National Electric Code) in the USA all PV Systems above 50V must have one current-carrying conductor connected to the ground/earth. With that, all exposed metal parts of the system must be grounded regardless of voltage. **DO NOT GROUND NEGATIVE PV LINE, ONLY SOLAR PANEL FRAMES.**

4.5.2 Battery Power Cable Connection



- 1. Place all breakers in the OFF position before connecting or disconnecting wires. Ensure that there is no voltage present with a voltmeter.
- 2. Strip 5/8–13/16 in. (15-20 mm) insulation from the cable end.
- 3. Route the battery power cable, connecting positive to BAT +, and negative to BAT -.
- 4. Secure the conduit fitting to the enclosure using the counter nut.
- 5. Fasten battery positive and negative cables to the mechanical terminals according to the markings with an M8 hex wrench.

4.5.3 Battery Communication Cable Connection

 Use the included battery communication cable to connect the battery to the inverter and choose *'Lithium'* as the battery type*. Please select the *'Lead-Acid'* setting if the lithium battery cannot communicate with the inverter. The battery communication port on the inverter is an RJ45 socket with the pinout for the RJ45 plug shown on the following image. Users can make the communication cable according to the inverter pin description below and the correct pinout of the communication port on the battery. The inverter supports both CAN and RS485 communication.

 After connecting the battery power and communication cables, enter the 'Advanced' settings to choose the battery type and brand. When prompted, enter "00000" as the password to enter settings menu.

Note: For communication with EG4 batteries, select "Lithium" under **'Battery type'** and then select "0: EG4" under **'Lith***ium Brand'*.

If you are using multiple battery modules with the inverter, the inverter communication cable must be connected to the master battery. Please check with your battery supplier for battery master and slave settings.

For Lead-Acid Battery:

The temperature sensor for lead-acid batteries is optional.

There are three stages for lead-acid battery charging. For charge/discharge related parameters, please check the **'Charge'** and **'Discharge'** settings in <u>Section 11.3.2 - Setting Parameters</u>.

Ground-Neutral Bonding

The information below describes the nature of the ground and neutral in the inverter and their relationship to the system. Always consult with your installer or a licensed electrician to ensure that the right configuration is being used:

- The neutral line is a solid connection between AC input and AC output (known as a Common Neutral Architecture).
- The neutral line between the AC input and AC output is never disconnected.
- The inverter never creates a ground-neutral bond in any mode of operation.
- The AC grounds, the PV grounds, and the inverter case are all permanently tied together.

Important

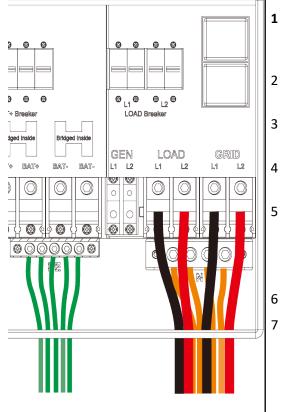
The system should have one and only one ground-neutral bond. (This is typically the Main Bonding Jumper located at the first grid system disconnect.)

4.5.5 Steps for AC Connection



Reminder

After connecting all AC wiring, put the built-in LOAD breaker back to the ON position before providing power to the load.



- Before connecting or disconnecting AC wires, ensure all breakers are in the OFF position. Check that there is no voltage present with a voltmeter.
- Strip off 5/16–3/8 in. (8–10 mm) insulation from the AC cables.
- Use wire ferrules if the cables are made of fine stranded wires.
- Secure the conduit fitting to the enclosure using the counter nut of the fitting.
- Fasten the GRID and LOAD cables to the terminal block in accordance with the terminal labels using an M8 hex wrench. (For ground terminal, use an M5 hex wrench.)

See section 4.5.4 for torque information

Secure conduit to the conduit fitting.

Check that the cables are connected properly. Take appropriate measures to ensure that the conduit and conduit fitting are properly secured and seal the cable entry holes.

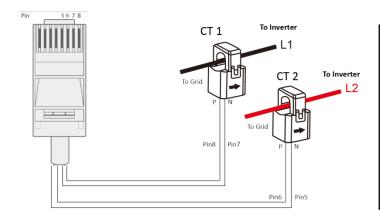
4.5.6 CT/Meter Connection

To measure the power imported from and exported to the grid, a pair of CTs or one, three-phase meter must be installed at the service entry point in or near the main service panel. Two CTs are provided with each inverter.

CT Port Pin Definition

The CT interface for the two (2) CT connections is an RJ45 port. The two (2) CTs come with premade plugs, so they can be connected directly to the port.

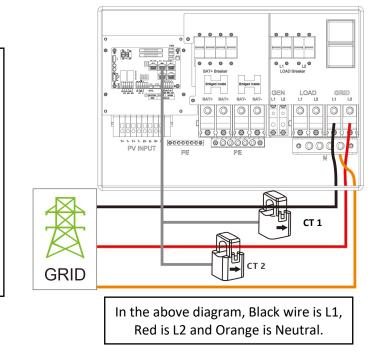
Please refer to the connection diagram to the left for the correct position of the CTs. Clamp the 2 CTs onto the L1 and L2 wires at the service entry point in the main service panel.

The arrows on the CTs must point toward the inverter and be placed on the proper line based on their number. (CT 1 for L1, CT 2 for L2)

CT Clamp Ratio

The inverter supports three ratios of CT clamps - 1000:1, 2000:1, and 3000:1. The CT ratio of the included CTs is 3000:1.

If you are using a third-party CT, please ensure that the CT ratio is one of the supported types. Select the correct CT ratio setting on the inverter monitoring page or on the inverter LCD.





Extending the CT Clamp Cable

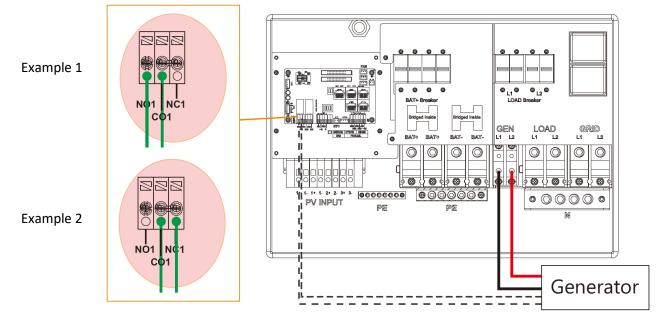
The CT wires can be extended with a common ethernet cable if they are not long enough. An RJ45 adapter is needed for the extension. The CT wires can be extended up to 300 ft. (around 100 m).

4.6 Working with a Generator4.6.1 Generator System Connection

This hybrid inverter can work with a generator. There are GEN terminals on the inverter for connecting the generator. When the generator is started, it will supply the inverter with the generator's max. power. If the generator's power is not adequate to power all loads, the inverter will pull from batteries as supplemental power.

Generator requirements:

- 1. Generator should be a 120/240VAC, 60 Hz generator.
- 2. Generator capacity should be **between** 6 21.6kW.



4.6.2 Connecting the Generator Start Signal (Dry Contact)

When the generator is started, all the loads connected to the LOAD terminals will be supplied by the generator while still charging batteries. The pass-through relay on the generator terminal is 90A. When the generator is on, please ensure the total load and charge current does not exceed 90A. The generator start signal shall be connected to the COM board GEN Normally Open (NO1 and CO1), or Normally Closed (NC1 and CO1) terminals, if users want to start generator remotely. See diagram above for 2 examples.

4.6.3 Generator Start and Stop Settings

The *"Operating Mode"* setting will determine whether the system will use either battery SOC or the battery voltage to start or stop the generator.

Generator Start Conditions

The generator will start when utility fails and one of the following conditions is met:

- when the battery is discharged to the cut-off setting or
- there is a force charge request from battery or

- when the battery voltage or SOC is lower than the generator 'Charge start Volt/SOC' setting

Generator Stop Conditions

When battery voltage or SOC is higher than the **Charge end Volt/SOC** settings.

4.7 Off-Grid

The 18kPV can fully function in Off-Grid only mode. It does not need the utility or generator to function. Purely off-grid systems that do not have access to the utility should strongly consider having a 2-wire start backup generator for extended cloudy periods (8-12 kW diesel recommended per 18kPV inverter - 21kWs max per inverter). Off-Grid systems should have robust battery banks sized to ensure multiple days of power and to reduce generator run time.

The 18kPV can also utilize AC Coupled solar input through the GEN port in purely Off-Grid Systems. The Generator can then be connected to the Grid Port.

4.7.1 Off-Grid Wiring

The 18kPV can accept up to 90 Amps (21.kWs) of generator power and will pass through all available power to the loads. Therefore, the Loads subpanel can be sized up to the size of the backup generator with a 60 Amp minimum per inverter.

Refer to Off-Grid Wiring Diagram 4.8 for an example.

4.8 AC Coupling Installation Connection

The inverter can accept PV solar inputs to both MPPT channels and AC coupled solar input at the same time. The AC coupled solar input can be up to 90A of AC power or 21.6kW of solar. The MPPT channels can handle up to 18kW of solar, with 12kW available for back feeding the utility grid. Therefore, up to 33.6kW of AC power could be sent back to the grid. For this amount of back feed, users will need either a feeder tap or supply side tap as the point of utility interconnection. (*See Diagrams 4.3 and 4.4 for more information*) The existing solar system is connected to the inverter's GEN terminal. *For AC Coupling wiring configuration, see Diagram 4.9*.

After the AC couple function is enabled:

When the grid is on, the GEN terminal is connected to the GRID terminal inside the inverter. In this case, the hybrid inverter will bypass the interactive inverter AC to the GRID and LOAD. Any remaining energy will be exported to the grid.

When the grid is off, the GEN terminal is connected to the LOAD terminal inside the inverter. In this case, the hybrid inverter will work as a power source for the grid-interactive inverter to synchronize and feed power to the micro-grid. The loads will be supplied by solar power first. If solar panels are generating more power than load consumption, the excess solar power will be stored in the batteries. When solar power exceeds the sum of load power and max battery charging power (e.g., when the batteries are nearly full), the inverter will signal the grid interactive inverter to reduce power via the frequency-shifting, power-reduction mechanism, thus maintaining the balance of generation and consumption of the micro-grid system.

What is frequency-shifting power reduction?

All UL1741SA compliant grid-interactive inverters have the Frequency-Watt feature, which requires the grid-interactive inverter to reduce power with increasing grid frequency. The power will drop to zero

before the over-frequency trip threshold is reached.

When the grid is down and the hybrid inverter requires an AC Coupled inverter to reduce power, it simply shifts the output frequency up slightly, and the grid-interactive inverter will limit its output power accordingly after sensing this frequency shift.

When the grid is up, the frequency is dictated by the grid and the hybrid inverter will reduce exported power if the frequency goes up.

4.8.1 AC Coupling Settings

The **AC couple** setting must be enabled when connecting an existing on-grid system to the GEN terminal. **Start SOC (%):** The SOC at which the AC coupled inverters are turned on when in off-grid mode (50% to 70% recommended).

End SOC (%): The SOC at which the AC coupled inverters are shut down when in off-grid mode (90% recommended).

When on-grid and export to grid are enabled, the AC-coupled inverter will always be on, and it will sell any extra power back to the grid. Ensure you are allowed to sell power to your utility provider when using AC-coupled PV arrays on-grid.

Note: It is recommended to keep the Start V/SOC and the End V/SOC within 5-10% of each other for optimal operations when utilizing AC Coupling.

4.9 Parallel System Connection

4.9.1 Connections for Parallel System

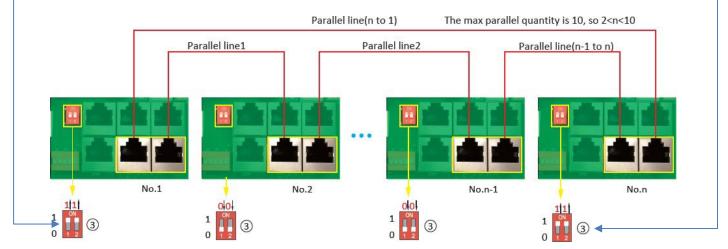
The hybrid inverter supports parallel connection to expand power and energy capacity to suit different usage scenarios. **Up to 10 units can be paralleled to reach a capacity of 120kW.**

The parallel wiring diagrams are as follows. The manual bypass switch connects the loads to LOAD panel as default. If the inverters fail, users can switch the loads to utility.



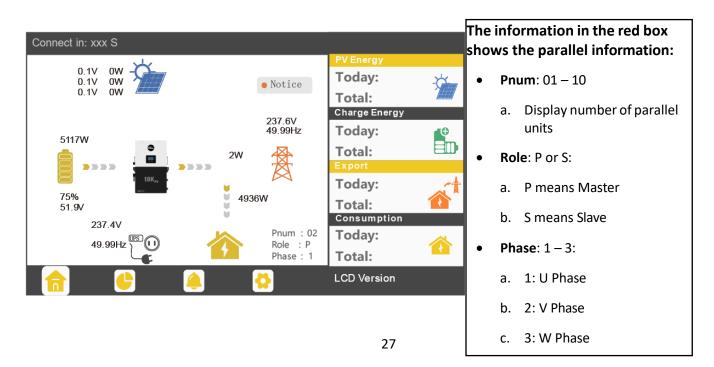
Remember!

Put the CAN communication PIN to ON status for the first and the last inverter and OFF for inverters in between.



Note: Both switches in the "ON" position translates to address 1. Both switches in the "OFF" position translates to address 0.

Notices for parallel system:

- ✓ Ensure that the generator is connected to all inverters in parallel (if available).
- If you cannot divide the number of PV panels connected to each inverter, it is recommended to have more PV panels on the master inverter.
- ✓ The values shown on the LCD of each inverter represent the inverter's contribution to the system, not the system's total.

4.9.3 Parallel Configuration

Before commissioning:

- 1. Verify that all the inverters are updated to the latest firmware. Please contact your distributor to confirm you have the latest version.
- 2. Make sure the power cables and parallel communications cables have been wired correctly and verify the DIP switch configurations are correct.
- 3. Power on the inverters and set them to standby via the *"Basic"* page in the settings.
- 4. Verify that the inverter status is "0".
- Select which unit you want as the Master by selecting *"1 phase master"* in Advanced settings. Set the others as *"Slave."*
- 6. Ensure all inverters are set to U phase.
- Enable Share battery on all inverters and ensure the communication cable from the battery is connected to the Master unit.

- 2. Check the parallel info via the Home page.
- 3. Turn on the "Off-grid output" function in the "Advanced" page.
- Before connecting load to load output terminal, check the output of L1 and L2, and L1 and N.







- 5. Add some small loads to the load output and verify power output.
- 6. Finish the commissioning.

4.10 Grid, Load, and AC Connection

4.10.1 Grid Type and Regulation Connection

This inverter can be used in 120/240V or 120/208V phase systems. This inverter has passed the main grid connection regulations in the U.S.

Users can choose the different grid type and regulation in the 'Advanced' program, as shown in the image below.

The inverter can withstand up to 8kW of imbalance between L1 and L2. However, the loads should be balanced as much as possible to avoid damaging the load side equipment.

The connection diagrams for 120/240V service are shown in the following pages. The connection diagram for 120/208V service is roughly the same except that the generator input is **not supported.**

- **Power Backup:** If Power Backup function is Enabled, the LOAD terminal will maintain output when AC is interrupted. You can set "Power Backup" via web or "Off-Grid Output" by LCD. (When enabling this mode, LOAD output will be uninterrupted)

- Set Slaves or Master: The EG4 18KPV supports paralleling of multiple inverters. You would need to connect the LOAD terminals together for paralleling. In this scenario we need to set one of the inverters to master and the others to Slave. If you install all inverters in one phase, be sure to set one of the inverters to "1 Phase Master". If you want to compose a three-phase system, set one of the inverters to "3 Phase Master". All inverters are set to Slaves by default, so when you get the inverters, you will need to set one inverter to Master.
- Set Composed Phase: When you use >= 3 inverters to compose a three-phase system, you must connect the AC terminals of the inverter to three-phase grids. (Used when composing a three-phase system) If there is utility in the system, the inverter will detect the phase it connects to automatically and record it. If there is still PV power after powering loads and battery charging; the remaining PV power will be sold back to the grid. In some situations, the customer would want solar power to charge battery first, and if there is more energy than needed; it will then power your loads. We would want to enable Charge First function. Charge First Power is the max power (kW) when charging battery in charge first mode. If the time is in the period that the user set and the battery SOC is less than the limit, the solar power will used to charge the battery first.

- **Charge First(PV):** When enabling this mode; solar power will charge the battery first, then take the home loads and if there is surplus power, feed into grid.
- Charge First Power(kW): The max charge power from PV.
- **Stop Charge First SOC(%)/Volt(V):** If the SOC is higher than limit SOC or Voltage, the inverter will stop charge first function.
- Charge First Start Time 1-3: Start time for PV Charge First setting.
- Charge First End Time 1-3: End time for PV Charge First setting.

- **Batt Discharge Control:** If the inverter communicates with the Lithium battery and is capable of closed-loop communication, then you can select charge control according to "SOC." When using lead-acid batteries or lithium batteries without communication, you can always select charge control according to "VOLT."

- **Time:** Set the time/date of the inverter. The input format is 2019-02-14 14:44:00. Format YYYY-MM-DD HH:MM:SS
- **MODBUS Addr:** Configure COM address in the RS-485 communication system. If you install more than one inverter in the field and use an RS-485 bus to communicate, you need to set the inverters to different address. Addresses range from 0-150.
- **PV Input Mode:** The connection type of solar modules.
- **Neutral Detect Enable/Disable:** Detects if the customer has connected the Neutral line to the AC Input terminal.

Model

- EPS Voltage Set(V): Set voltage of the inverter's output.
- **PV Grid Off:** If the customer wants the system to have Off-Grid functionality without installing any batteries, please enable PV Grid Off. Please note, in this situation the Off-Grid energy is supplied by solar and is not stable. We suggest the customer install battery/batteries to keep the EPS/UPS output voltage stable if they want to have Off-Grid function. (Allow system to access the Off-Grid mode when only solar input is available)
- **Power Backup:** If Power Backup function is Enabled, the LOAD terminal will maintain output when AC is interrupted. You can set "Power Backup" via web or "Off-Grid Output" by LCD. (When enabling this mode, the inverter's output will be uninterrupted).
- Seamless EPS Switching: When power is interrupted, the inverter will turn to EPS mode seamlessly unless there is a grid voltage fluctuation issue; in which case, we suggest you set to "Disable" to avoid misjudgment.

- Set System Type: The EG4 18KPV supports paralleling of multiple inverters. You would need to connect the LOAD terminals together for paralleling. In this scenario we need to set one of the inverters to Master and the others to Slave. If you install all inverters as single-phase, be sure to set one of the inverters to "1 Phase Master". If you want to compose a three-phase system, set one of the inverters to "3 Phase Master". All inverters are set to Slaves by default, so when you get the inverters, you will need to set one inverter to Master when paralleling multiple inverters.
- Set Composed Phase: When you use ≥ 3 inverters to compose a three-phase system, you
 must connect the AC terminals of the inverter to a three-phase grid (Used when composing a
 three-phase system). If the system is connected to the grid, the inverter will detect the phase
 it connects to automatically, record it and output the phase as it detected. If the user setting is
 different from the phase the inverter detected, it will output the phase detected. The output

7.3 Grid Connect Settings

- **Grid Regulation:** Select the correct Grid safety regulation.
- **Grid Frequency:** If the Grid Frequency is nominal at 50Hz, then the inverter's Frequency will be adjusted to 50Hz automatically. If there is no grid power and it is read as 50Hz but the devices are 60Hz; then you can set to 60Hz manually. This is based on the rated frequency of the local grid regulation and devices.
- Grid Type: Select the correct Grid type to function, such as split phase: 240/120 or 208/120V.

Charge First

For the EG4 18KPV in default mode; if PV power is sufficient to cover the demands of home loads, then PV power will prioritize home loads first. If there is excessive PV power; the remainder will be used to charge the battery. If there is still PV power after powering loads and battery charging; the remaining PV power will be sold back to the grid. In some situations, the customer would want solar power to charge battery first, and if there is more energy than needed; it will then power your loads. We would want to enable Charge First(PV) function. Charge First power CMD is the max power percent when charge battery in charge first mode. If the time is in the period that the user set and the battery SOC is less than the limit, the solar power will used to charge the battery first.

• Charge First(PV): Enable this setting to prioritize Solar for charging batteries.

- Charge First Power (kW): The max charge power from PV.
- Stop Charge first SOC (%)/Volt (V): The inverter sill stop charging the batteries if the battery SOC or Voltage exceeds these limits.

- Batt Discharge Control: If the inverter communicates with the Lithium battery and is capable of closed-loop communication, then you can select discharge control according to "SOC." When using lead-acid batteries or lithium batteries without communication, you can always select discharge control according to "VOLT."
- **Discharge Current Limit(Adc):** The max. discharge current limit when grid power is on.
- **Start Discharge P_Import(W):** Default value is 100 which means the battery will begin to discharge power to take the load when the import power from grid is higher than 100Watts. (Adjust range [50-100]).
- On-Grid Cut-Off SOC(%)/Volt(V): When the inverter connects to the grid and if the battery

is discharging to take the load, it will stop discharge when the SOC/Voltage is lower than this limit.

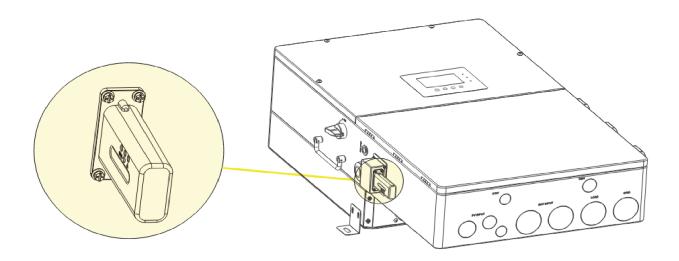

8.1 Wi-Fi/4G Dongle Connection

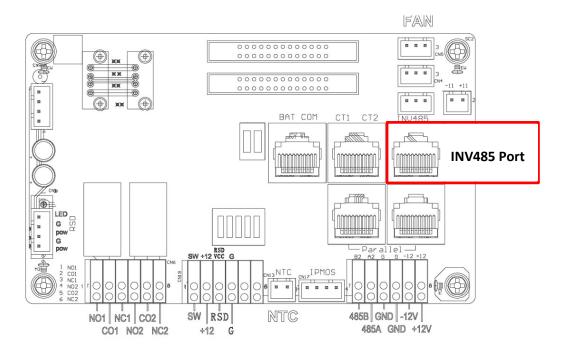

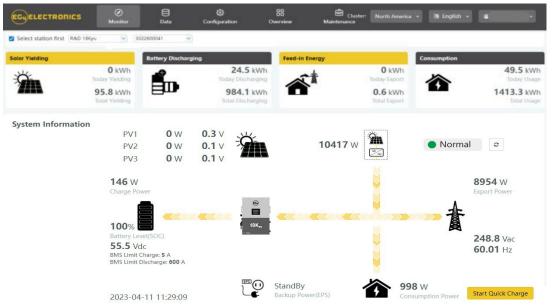

- 4. Select the Wi-Fi network you want to connect to and the click "OK." Input the Wi-Fi password and click "Save."

Battery Dis- charging/Charging	Shows the charge and discharge energy from the battery/batteries. When the battery picture is clicked, the display will switch between battery discharging and battery charging, showing totals for that day and since commissioning.
Feed-in En- ergy/Import	Shows energy exported to grid for that day and since commissioning. When the picture is clicked, it shows energy imported from the grid for that day and since commissioning.
Consumption	Shows the total energy consumption of the property for that day and since commissioning.
System information	Displays power sources and energy flow, voltage, and amperage from lines to loads. Clicking the button beside the status will refresh the information to reflect real time data. Note: When the battery's color is yellow or red it means there is a warning or fault with the battery.
Start Quick Charge	Clicking this will direct the inverter to charge batteries faster for one hour. It will then default back to its original setting.

Local data is recorded while the system is offline for more than 20 minutes and is taken every 5 minutes. Data can be stored in the system for a maximum of 90 days.

The "Maintenance" view is used for firmware updates and to remotely change settings on your inverter by selecting a station and then an inverter serial number.

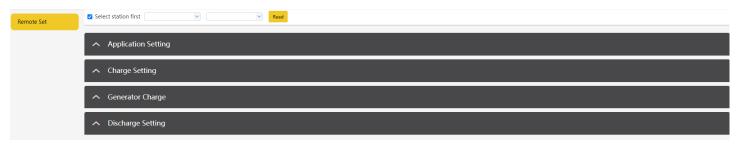
Distributors can manage all settings for all inverters at once with the help of the batch setting capability supported by EG4's monitor system.

9 Firmware Updates

9.1 Firmware Update via EG4 Electronics App

NOTE: When updating your firmware through the EG4 APP, be sure to have plenty of battery life on your device and do not close the application. Make sure you have the Wi-Fi dongle connected securely and correctly configured (*See Section 10 for Wi-Fi Dongle connection steps*) for the inverter before performing the following steps.

Step 1: Open the EG4 Electronics APP on your mobile phone and select the "DOWNLOAD FIRMWARE" button.

Step 2: Choose the correct firmware file (contact your distributor for most up to date files) and select "DOWNLOAD" on the right side to download the file to your mobile device.

Step 3: Keep the APP running and go to your phone's Wi-Fi settings. Connect your mobile device to the Dongle's network. The Dongle's Network ID will be the same as the Dongle's Serial Number.

Step 4: Return to the home screen of the APP and select "LOCAL CONNECT". Select the "Set" button on the bottom right side and proceed to the next step.

Step 5: After completing step 4, the Local Set Interface as shown above will appear. Swipe upward on your phone screen until the "Update Firmware" button is visible at the bottom of the APP's display.

Step 6: Choose the correct installation package in the dropdown box and click "UPDATE FIRMWARE" to begin the updating process.

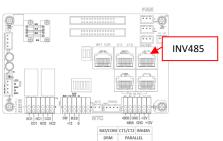
After clicking the "UPDATE FIRMWARE" button, the update will begin. Update progress can be viewed via the APP as well as the inverter's LCD screen. Once the update is completed, a notification will appear confirming that the firmware has been successfully updated (as shown in photo). After successfully updating firmware, the inverter will restart itself.

Make sure to update all inverters to the latest firmware that are installed in the same ESS.

9.2 Firmware Update via Hard-Wired Ethernet Connection

Step 1: First, construct a USB-A to RS485 converter cable. You will utilize Pins 1 & 2 on the RJ45 connector crossed over to pins A & B on the USB connector. (1 to B and 2 to A)

Step 2: With the inverter powered on, plug the RS485 end of your cable into the IN485 port on the interface board as shown in the image to the right, and plug the USB end into your PC.









Note: Be sure to disconnect the WIFI dongle when utilizing this direct connection.

Step 3: Run the Wlocal.exe software. (Please contact your distributor for access to this program)

NOTE: The progress bar on the WLocal.exe software only represents the firmware files uploading to the inverter, **NOT** the progress of the update itself. 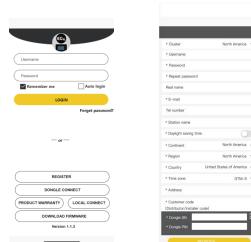

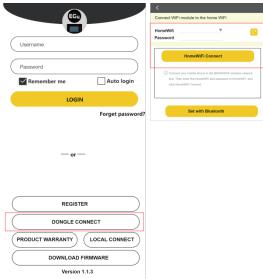

a. Plug in the Wi-Fi dongle, and power on the inverter.

b. Wait until the INV LED on the Wi-Fi module is solid on, then connect your phone to the Wi-Fi hotspot. The hotspot name is the same as the Wi-Fi dongle serial number. (See image on left)

- c. Open the app. Click on "DONGLE CONNECT". Click the Yellow refresh button to display a list of available networks. Select your wireless network name and enter your password.
- d. After clicking Home Wi-Fi Connect, the Wi-Fi dongle will reset. After you set the correct password, three lights will be solid on, which means the inverter is connected to the server. You can then return to the login page and input your account and password to begin monitoring your system.

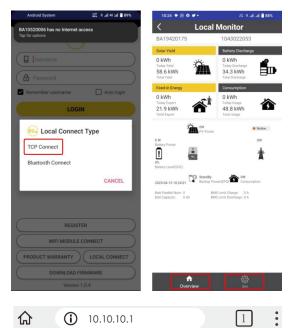

After setting the right Wi-Fi password, all three lights should be on solidly. If it is still flashing, try the following:

 Check to see if the Wi-Fi is connected and that the correct password has been entered. You can use your device to connect to a Wi-Fi hotspot and visit the website 10.10.10.1 to check; the TCP

client status should be "connected" as seen in the image. The login username and password are both "admin." Check your Wi-Fi name and password if it is.

Prior to setting the password, you should add the dongle to the system. After you register and enter the Wi-Fi SN and PIN, this dongle is automatically added to the system. While logged in, go to "Configuration" -> "Dongles" -> "Add dongle" on https://monitor.eg4electronics.com/ to add this dongle to your current configuration if you have more than one dongle. 11 Operation Guide

11.1 Operation Mode and Function

11.1.1 Self-Usage Mode

In this mode, the order of priority for powering loads is Solar>Battery>Grid. The order of priority for solar power usage is Load>Battery>Grid.

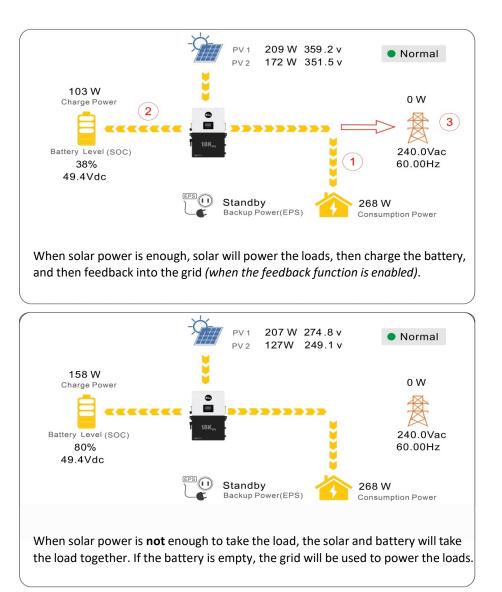
• Application Scenarios

Self-usage mode will increase the self-consumption rate of solar power and reduce energy bills significantly.

Related Settings

Effective when Charge Priority, AC Charge, and Forced Discharge are disabled.





11.1.2 Charge First Mode

The order of priority for solar power usage will be Battery>Load>Grid. During the **charge first** period, loads are first supplied power from the grid. If there is excess solar power after charging batteries, the excess solar will power the loads along with grid power.

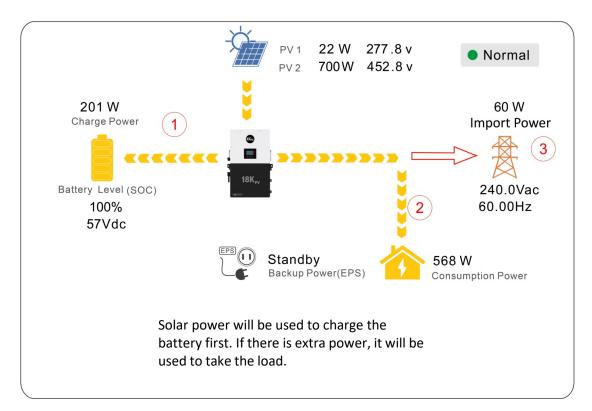

AC charger mode

Users can charge batteries with grid power when electricity prices are low, then use battery power run loads or export to the grid when electricity prices are high.

Application Scenarios

When users have a Time of Use (TOU) rate plan.

Related Settings (see image to left)

Grid peak-shaving and peak-shaving power (kW):

Used to set the maximum power that the inverter will draw from the grid. See page 84 for examples.

Smart Load: This function will make the GEN input connection point to a load connection point. If enabled, the inverter will supply power to this load when the battery SOC and PV power are above user set values.

For Example: *Smart load start SOC=90% Smart load end SOC=85%*

Start PV power=1kW means:

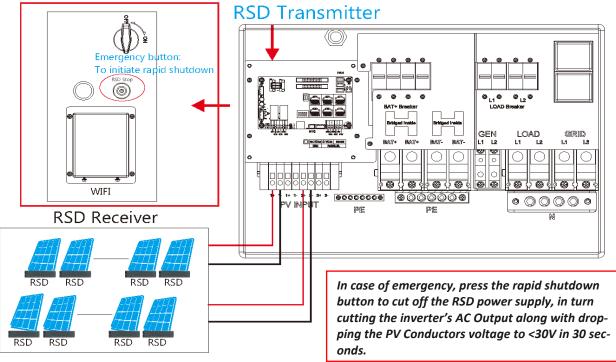
When the PV power exceeds 1000W, and the battery system SOC gets to 90%, the Smart Load Port (GEN) will automatically switch on to power the connected load. When the battery reaches SOC<85% or PV power<1000W, the Smart Load Port automatically switches off.

Important Note:

If the smart load function is enabled, a generator **cannot** be connected at the same time; otherwise, the device will be damaged!

11.2 Rapid Shutdown (RSD)

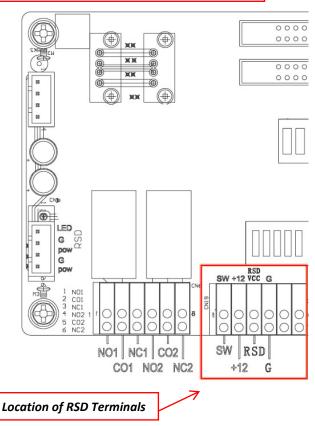
The inverter includes a rapid shutdown system that complies with 2017 and 2020 NEC 690.12 requirements. A rapid shutdown switch should be connected to the RSD terminals on the inverter and mounted on a readily accessible location outdoors (check with your AHJ for requirements). **Note:** When using supported EG4 batteries in closed-loop communications with the inverter, the RSD also initiates ESS Disconnect as required by NEC code.



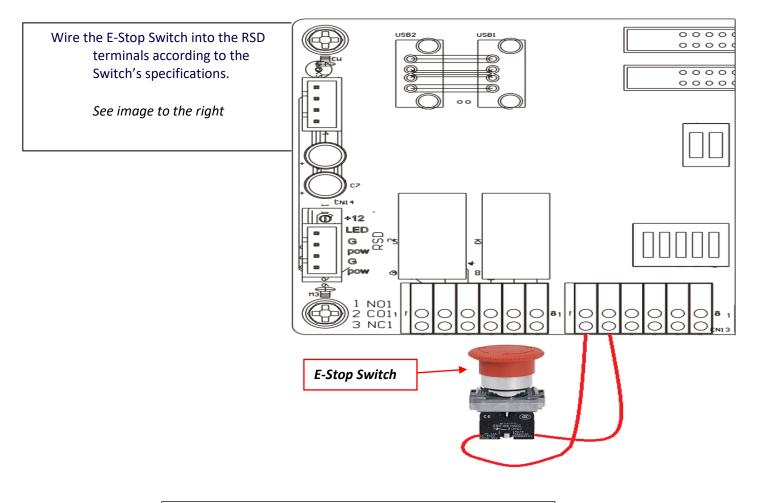
11.2.1 External RSD

The system can also utilize an External E-Stop Switch if your AHJ deems it necessary.

- 1. Type of External E-Stop Switch for RSD Requirements:
 - a. The external switch must have normally closed contact type for emergency shut-down.
- 1. If trying to utilize external E-Stop switch, please see following subsection for instructions.

If export is allowed, users can enable '**Export to Grid'** and set a maximum allowable export limit in '**Max Export to Grid(kW)**.' **Note:** Zero Export cannot prevent export of energy supplied by inverters that are AC Coupled to the 18kPV.

2. Charge Settings

When the inverter detects the import power is higher than this value, the battery starts discharging; otherwise, the battery will stay in standby.

On-grid Cut-off (%), Off-grid Cut off (%) / **On-grid Cut-off(V)**, **Off-grid Cut off(V)**: End of discharge SOC/Cut-off voltage when the system is in an on-grid or off-grid situation, respectively.

Forced discharge: This setting will force the battery to discharge within the programmed period. In the preset period, the inverter will discharge the battery at the power set by *'Discharge power(kW)'* until battery SOC or voltage reaches *'Stop discharge'* value.

Grid Regulation: Select the correct Grid safety regulation.

Grid Frequency: If the Grid Frequency is nominal at 50Hz, then the inverter's Frequency will be adjusted to 50Hz automatically. If there is no grid power and it is read as 50Hz but the devices are 60Hz; then you can set to 60Hz manually. This is based on the rated frequency of the local grid regulation and devices.

Battery type: No battery, Lead-acid, or Lithium.

If '*Lead-acid'* battery is selected, please input the correct battery capacity.

If '*Lithium*' battery is selected, please choose the battery's brand in the Lithium brand drop-down list.

Meter or CT: The supported CT ratio is 1000:1, 2000:1, and 3000:1. The default CT ratio is 3000:1. If thirdparty CT is used, please ensure its CT ratio is one of the three supported types and set it accordingly.

Meter type: Please choose setting according to the meter installed.

Off-grid output: Enabling this setting will cause the inverter to provide backup power if the grid is lost.

'Seamless switch' must be enabled if users want the load to be transferred seamlessly to the inverter backup power.

'**No Battery**' can be enabled to use solar power to supply load when the grid fails or load-shedding happens. If users do not have a battery installed yet but still wish to have inverter backup power with only solar panels connected, this setting can be enabled.

'Micro-grid' should be set *only* when the generator is connected to the inverter's Grid terminal. With this option enabled, the inverter will use AC power to charge the battery and will not export any power through the Grid terminal if AC power is present at the inverter's Grid terminal.

'Charge last' will use solar power in the following order: 1. Loads> 2. Grid export> 3. Battery charging.

'CT direction reversed' occurs when both CTs are installed in the wrong direction; the installer can remedy this by checking this box.

'Role' setting of the parallel system. It is set to *'1 phase master'* by default. In a parallel system, only one inverter is allowed to be set as Master and the others are set as Slaves.

'Phase' is the phase code setting of the load output. The system will automatically detect the phase sequence of the inverter (consistent with the phase sequence of the

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connected grid mains) and display it on the inverter after it is connected to the grid.

'Share battery': If all inverters are connected to the same battery bank when configured as a parallel system, then this setting must be **enabled**. If the inverters are configured as a parallel system and are connected to independent battery banks, then this setting must be **disabled**.

Reminder:

- All setting changes for parallel inverters must be done while in Standby Mode.
- If the system is connected to a lithium battery, the host of the battery bank needs to communicate with the inverter that is set as Master in the parallel system.
- Keep all the settings the same for each inverter in the parallel system on the LCD or remote monitor!

11.4 Inverter Start-Up and Shutdown Procedure

11.4.1 Starting up the inverter

1. If equipped, turn on(close) the DC breaker between battery and inverter first. Turn on the BAT breaker located in the cable box of the inverter and then power on the battery system.

- 2. Make sure the PV voltages of the strings are within operating parameters. Turn on(close) PV isolator switches between the inverter and array and then on the side of the inverter.
- 3. Make sure Steps 1 and 2 are running properly before turning on the grid power or generator breaker.
- 4. Power on the load breakers in the cable box of the inverter and then in the load panel.

11.4.2 Shutting down the inverter

Danger!

Never disconnect the battery, PV, or AC input power under load. If there is an emergency and users must shut down the inverter, please follow the steps outlined below.

- 1. Turn off the grid breaker feeding the inverter.
- 2. Switch off the load breaker.
- 3. Turn off the PV Isolator switch and then battery breaker. Wait for the LCD to go off.

12 Troubleshooting & Maintenance

12.1 Regular Maintenance

Inverter Maintenance

- ✓ Inspect the inverter every 6 months to check for any damaged cables, accessories, or terminals, and inspect the inverter itself.
- ✓ Inspect the inverter every 3 months to verify if the operating parameters are normal and there is no abnormal heating or noise from all components in the system.
- Inspect the inverter every month to confirm nothing covers the inverter heat sink. If there is, shut down the inverter and clear the heat sink to restore proper cooling.

Battery Maintenance

✓ Follow the manufacturer's requirements on maintenance. When users carry out maintenance on batteries, please make sure to fully shut down the inverter for safety.
